I hope everyone has had a good winter. It has been a cold one, but at least the snow fall has been minimal. Hopefully we have an early spring.

During the 2022 season, we will be installing 150 new residential lights. When this project is complete, all of the lighting in town will be LED. These lights will pay for themselves within five years with the energy savings, and will be a nice upgrade. We hope to receive the lights in the coming weeks and will start with installation immediately.

We will also be installing a new transformer and metering at the new assisted living. There will be a new light fixture and base at the north entrance to the nursing home, as well. After these two projects, the MHS project will be complete.

Another project we will start working on is the replacement of connectors on the power lines that run from the poles in the alley to the houses. These connectors have been failing, which then causes outages to individual homes. We will have to shut power off to the house while installing these, but will give notice to homeowners before we start. We average about five outages a year because of these connectors, and hope to change these out completely in the next few years.

With the County landfill now closed, the City of Madison has had to look at different options for city-wide cleanup. Although the process will be different, we would like to keep this service for the residents of Madison available. Clean up will be held on Saturday, May 7, from 8 a.m. to 12 p.m., at the Water Treatment Plant.

We will also be crack-filling section two of three of streets and avenues which includes 5<sup>th</sup> Avenue up to 1<sup>st</sup> Avenue. Proper maintenance of our streets prevents them from aging too quickly. Part three of the project will finish in 2023.

Madison's pool will undergo a few repairs this spring. Contractors will repair some of the pool lining in the shallow end. We also purchased a new chemical controller for the pool and slide making it safer, easier to operate and more effective. It will alert us if the chemicals become close to falling outside the parameters or a problem has occurred with the equipment. A lot of work is done to keep our pools safe for swimmers and this will be a huge step in the safety of everyone!

Mosquitoes have been surprisingly manageable the last few years, but as a reminder, homeowners need to be aware of breeding site on their property. Avoid standing water and keep grass cut. Mosquitoes like to hang out in cool, shady spots along with water. The best approach to mosquito control is to keep them from showing up in the first place.

On a final note, it has been a great honor to have worked with Betty these last few years. Betty has worked with the city for 32 years and 10 months at the time of her retirement. She has always put pride in anything she does and it truly shows. So if you happen to see Bobcat Betty out and about, make sure you thank her for all her hard work and years of service.
